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RECREATION SURVEY RESULTS

Household Survey Design and Selection

A survey of public attitudes, recreation interests and recreation participation characteristics was made in the Woodinville area during July 2000. Questionnaires were distributed to randomly selected households in the City. Each member of the selected household aged ten and over was asked to fill out a questionnaire.

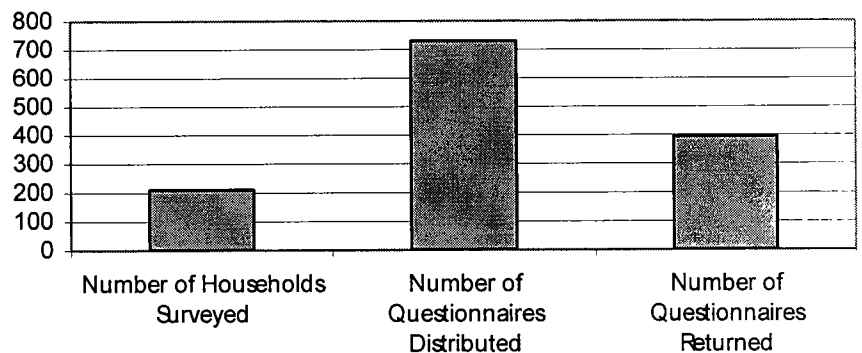
Based on the City's population of 10,280, 370 valid returns were needed to obtain a 95 percent confidence level. In Woodinville, the actual number of questionnaires returned was 394, which represents a 95.15 confidence level.

Survey Area

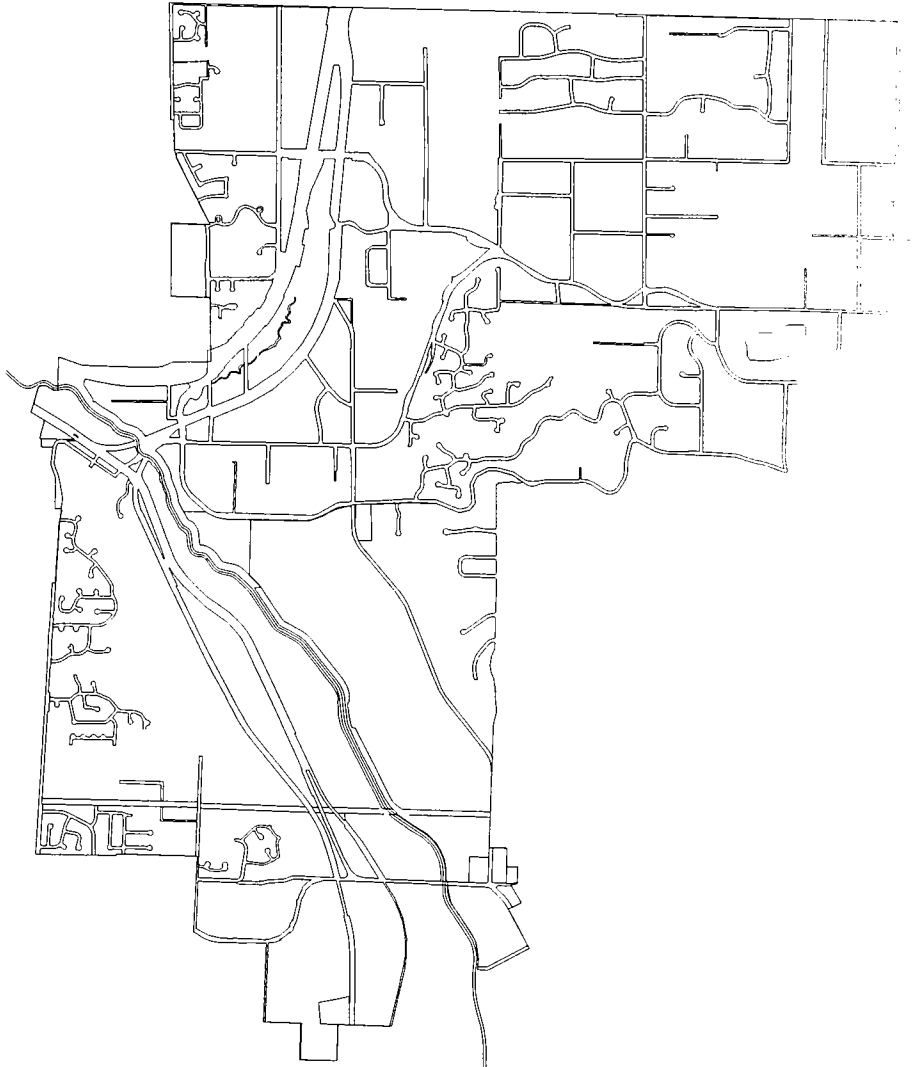

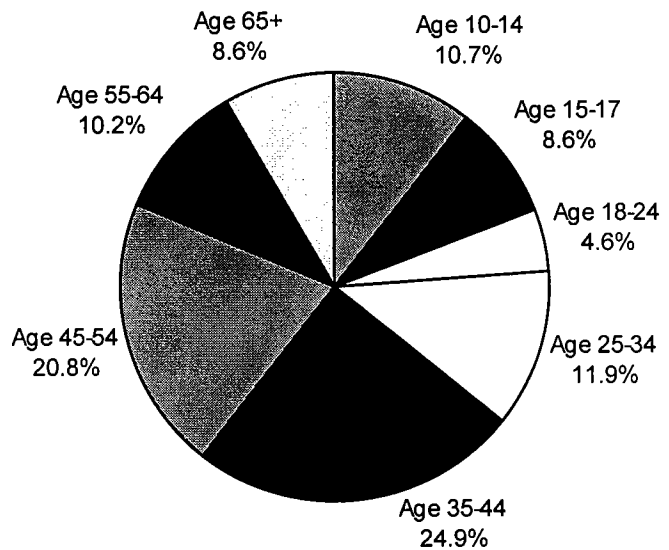
1. Age of Respondent:

Observations of Table 2:

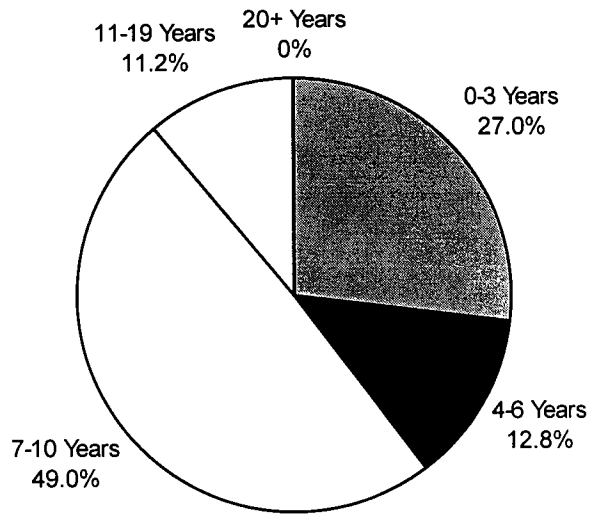
- The highest percentage of responses was obtained from the 35-44 and 45-54 age groups.

Observations of Table 6:

- The most frequently cited facility was “ sports fields” - specifically, soccer fields.
- “ Swimming pools” and “ additional parks” were also cited as needed facilities.
- If additional facilities, such as teen center, performing arts space and racquetball courts were added to the indoor facility, it would rank as the second most frequent response.

Observations of Table 7:

- Based on the responses, the most frequently used facility at the Sorenson School Site was the “ sports fields.”
- In contrast, very few of the respondents use the Sorenson site for its “ gymnasium.”

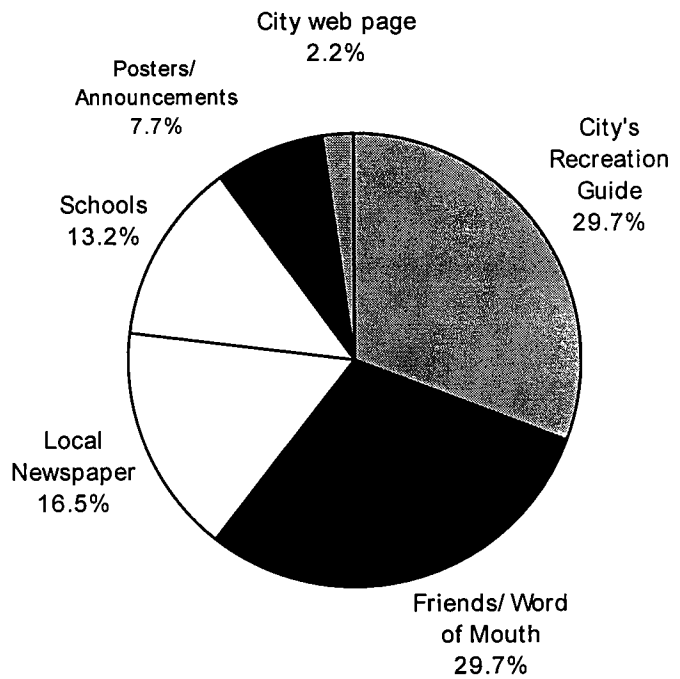

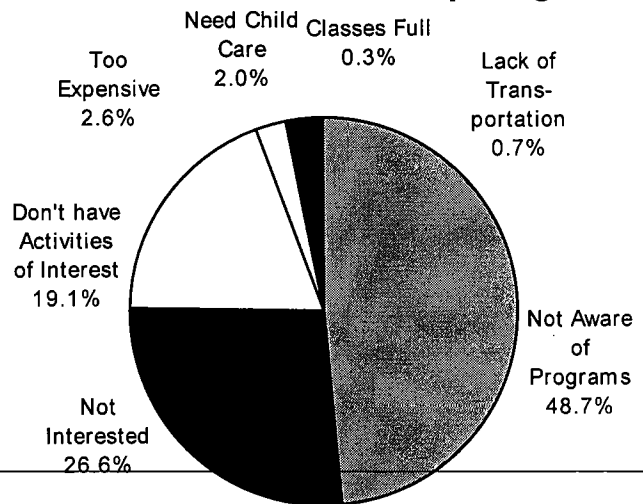
- When asked how they found out about the City' s programs, the largest percentage of respondents cited " from the City' s Recreation Guide." This amount is above average for other communities we have surveyed.

Observations of Table 11:

- The largest percentage of respondents cited “ not aware of programs offered.” This is a very high percentage compared to other communities throughout the northwest. The relative youth of the City and its Departments may be a factor here.
- “ I am not interested in participating” and “don’ t have activities I’ m interest in” were also cited frequently as reasons for not participating in City programs.
- “ Too expensive,” “ need childcare in order to participate,” “ lack of transportation” and “ classes or programs are full” did not appear to be major factors for the lack of involvement.

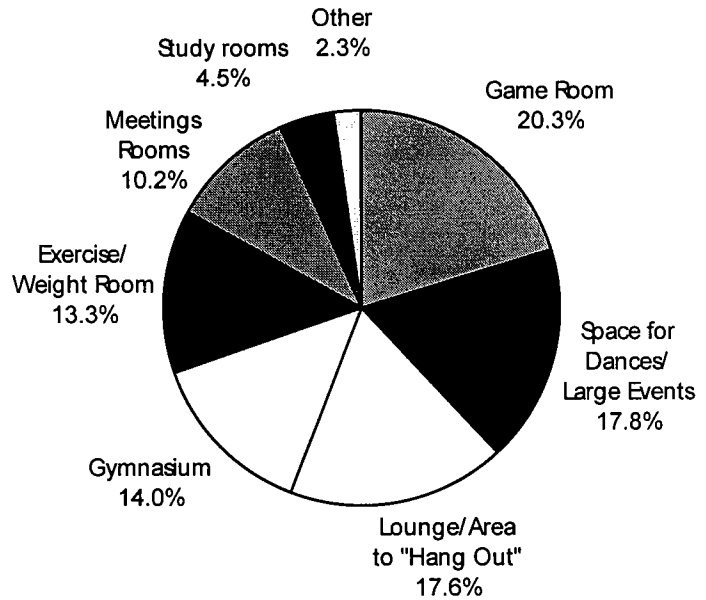

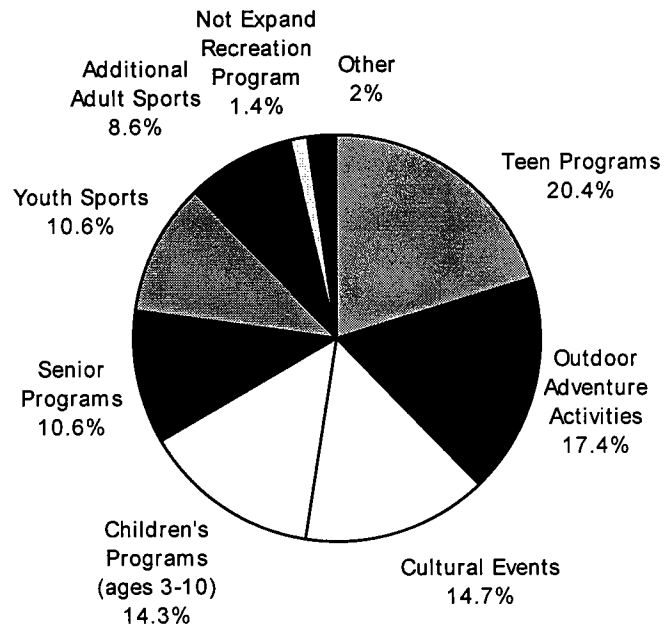

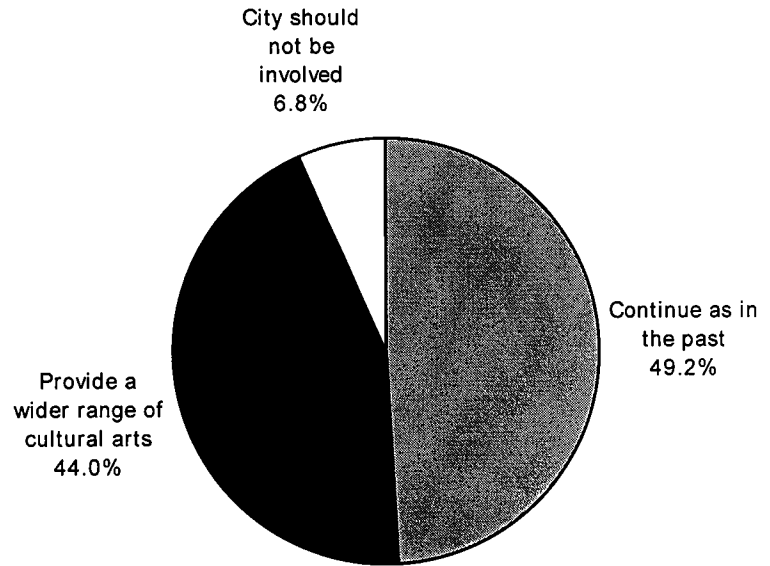

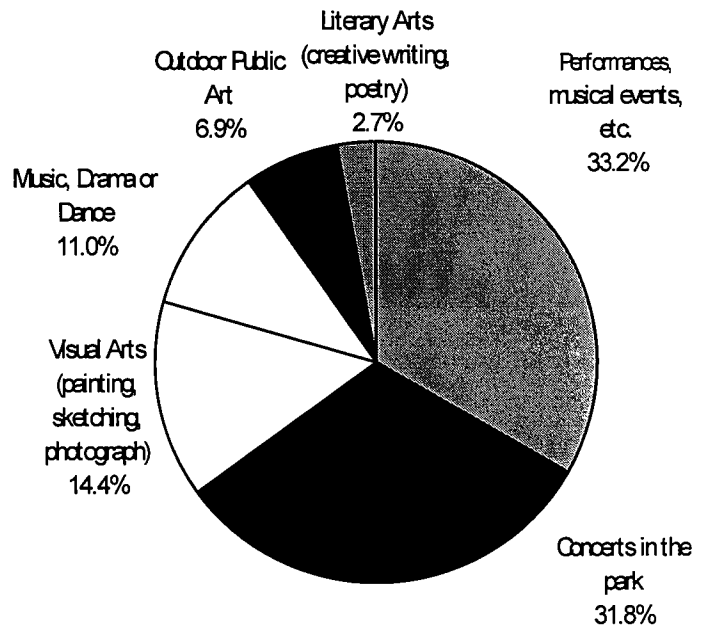

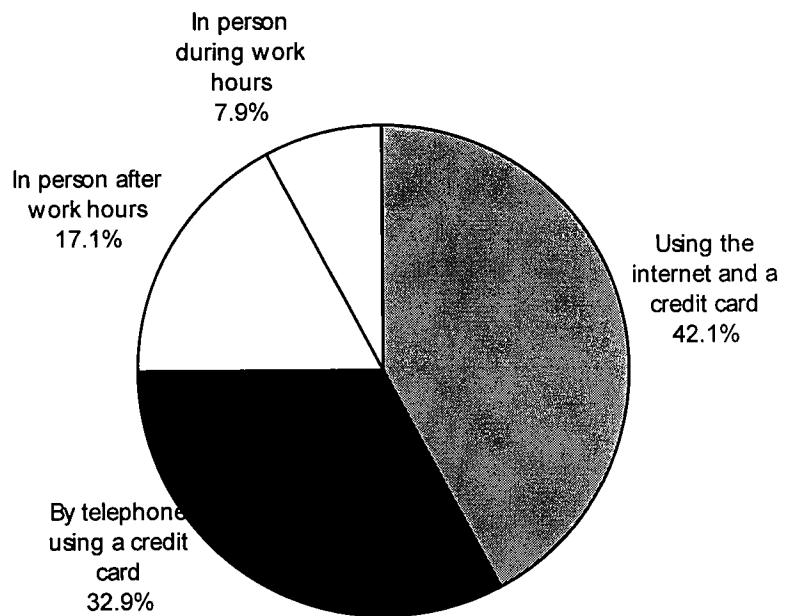

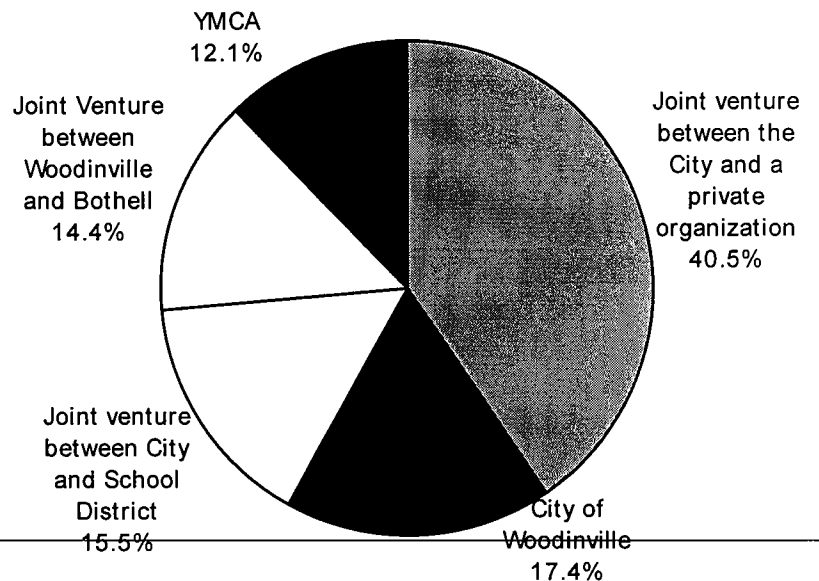

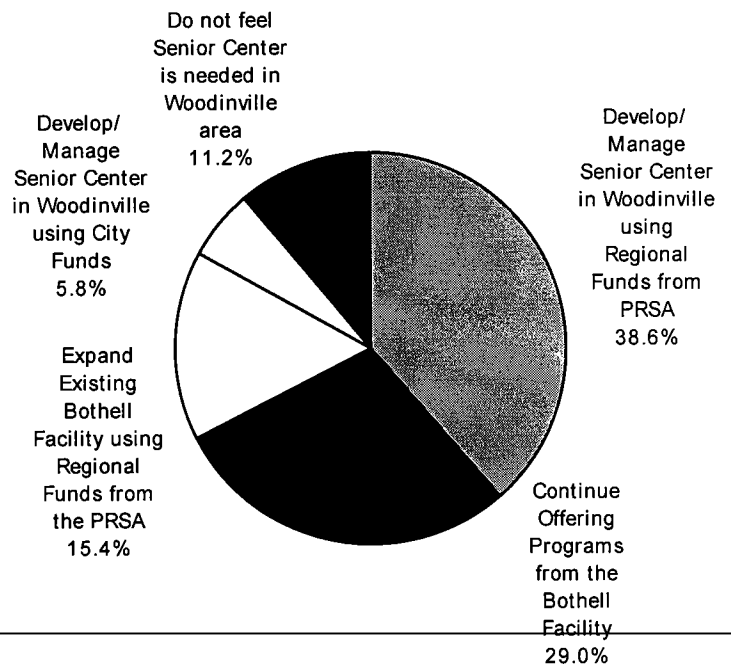

- Only 5.8% of the respondent cited that the City should “ develop and manage a senior center in Woodinville” .

Community Needs Assessment

The City of Woodinville recently purchased ten (10) acres known as the Sorenson Property. The City will soon relocate its offices to a site near the Brittany Park Retirement Community. The Sorenson School buildings are near the end of their service life as a school and may have limited uses for community purposes in their current configuration. Because of these factors, the community was asked to help decide how the Sorenson Site should be developed in the future. In Part 1, respondents were asked to review activities and facilities and rate each one on a scale of 1-10 with 1 being not needed and 10 being highly needed within the community. In Part 2, respondents were asked to indicate whether or not the activity would be an appropriate facility for the Sorenson site.
